Brothers, by the time this issue is printed and mailed I pray that we will be moving fast away from the bitter cold and snow. I would like to thank everyone who has brought a new member to the order this year, thank you, THANK YOU! And for those who have not brought that one new member, just ask a fellow Catholic man and his family to join us.

Recently the sermon at my home Parish revolved around the fact that we are always preaching to the choir. And the funny thing is who better to preach to. We are called to be evangelizers of our faith. We are called to bring others to or back to our church. And how do we do that one might ask, well, it is simple – we ask them. Sound a little familiar, how do we get a catholic man and his family to join us, we just ask them.

I have been asked: Why don't the young men step forward and join the Knights. My response is a simple one: I just say, do what I do every morning; look at the face in the mirror that is looking back at you. Look at your council, are all the faces showing the lines of age. Young men do not know if they are welcome or not, they don't know how "old" you have to be to join the Knights. With rare exception we recruit our own age bracket so ASK that young man to join and ask him to bring along a couple of his best friends.

When we ask a Catholic man and his family to join us we give them reason to be active in Mass and Church activities. Why, because that is what we tell them through our degree work – be active in your council and church, support the Holy Father and our Bishops and Priests – family is key – work for those who need our help and

above all pray. Our Catholic faith is the one true bond of our organization and no other organization can boast that claim. We have over 1.8 million brothers around the world and 72,600 brothers here in Illinois but there are another 250,000 catholic men and their families here in Illinois that are waiting to be asked to join us.

We are all part of the choir and it is our responsibility to strengthen the choir by bringing more tenors, bass and baritones by asking men and their families to join us. We are the evangelizers for our church and our order. By bringing in a new member you give him the chance to strengthen his faith, the desire to be a more informed Catholic as well as be a better husband and father.

Thank you for all you have done these last 20 months and continue to help Illinois as we reach for the Circle of Honor status again this year. The fraternal year ends June 30, 2011 so we have plenty of time to reach the opportunity for greatness (2,900 new members) plus 10% (290 new members) so that others know that the Knights of Columbus of Illinois are not only alive but well and growing.

Remember the State Convention is scheduled for April 29 – May 1, 2011 at the Crowne Plaza in Springfield.

Dear Brother Knights,

Within the next few weeks, we will begin the season of Lent. We can approach this season with mixed emotions. There is a story of a pastor visiting his school during Lent and asking the 2nd graders what happened on

Easter Sunday. One boy proudly raises his hand and responds, "It's when Jesus comes out of the tomb and if he sees his shadow, there are 40 more days of Lent."

I confess that when I was young, I had similar feels about Lent. It seemed so long, probably because it meant no TV, no candy, and other practices that I didn't enjoy. As an adult, I have come to recognize Lent as a precious time – a gift – a built-in excuse to work on areas of my life where I need to change to grow closer to the Lord. It is a 40-day retreat – a time to seek renewal from the heart. It's not about self-improvement or losing that excess weight, rather it is a real opportunity to become a new person – the person Christ wants me to be. The Church gives us three disciplines to help us in our Lenten mission of renewal: prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Each of these is interrelated, so that we remain balanced, keeping us from becoming so introspective that we forget our obligation to live out our faith in service to others. It is important to prayerfully prepare a realistic Lenten program for yourself before Ash Wednesday, asking the Lord to guide you in the disciplines that you most need to grow in your relationship with him.

One of the best ways to enter into the Lenten Season is to participate in daily Mass. The Scripture readings for each of the Lenten Masses were specially chosen to provide a lesson on the spiritual life. If you are unable to attend daily Mass, take some time to reflect on these readings, which are usually listed in your parish bulletin.

Lent is the primary season of reconciliation in the Church year and everyone is encouraged to receive this Sacrament during this holy time. It is an opportunity to seek healing for the wounds our sins have caused in our relationship with God, others and even ourselves.

May we walk the path of holiness this Lent - through our prayer, through our self-denial, through our acts of charity – lived out in the steps laid out for us by the Church, that Easter may find us renewed in faith, hope and love. Be assured of my prayers for you and your families during this season of grace.

GUIDELINES FOR CONDUCTING CHARITY FUNDRAISERS

In planning and conducting charitable fundraising event, councils should be guided by the following principles:


1. Councils may use the name "Knights of Columbus " in conjunction with the charity fundraiser, so long as the individual council is clearly identified within the name, i.e., "Knights of Columbus (Name of Council) Council No. ____". The councils **are not to use the name "Knights of Columbus"** standing alone.
2. Fund-raising activities should be used only to raise money for a worthy charitable organization, consistent with the mission of the Order and our first principle of Charity. The beneficiary organization should be identified in advertising for the event.
3. Proceeds from a charity fund-raiser cannot be used to pay for ordinary council expenses or liabilities. The proceeds must be disbursed as follows:
 - a. Payment of the expenses associated with the event;
 - b. Gift to charitable organization
4. Councils should obtain event insurance to cover all potential liabilities associated with the event.
5. If a council uses the services of a professional fund-raiser, event organizer, or a similar entity, such services should be obtained on a one-time basis. The **council should not** enter into a joint venture with any company or organization.

The State Convention is fast approaching, which means it's time to start thinking about resolutions. Resolutions are a formal statement or opinion that members, through their council can express and present matters of importance to delegates at convention for their consensus and action. Council leaders have a responsibility to inform their members of this right of opportunity. Please encourage members to use this right of expression.

Councils must forward resolutions to the State Advocate on behalf of the State Deputy **thirty-five (35)** days in advance of the State Council Meeting. As our State Convention is to be held April 29 & 30 and May 1 the deadline for resolutions to be considered at the 2011 convention is **March 26, 2011**. I would appreciate if councils would mail resolutions by **March 1**, to allow time for copy and distribution to the Resolutions Committee who will meet prior to the convention to recommend action on the resolutions.

**NOTE: All resolutions must be sent as hard copy
All resolution must have the Council seal affixed
Only Councils can submit resolution.
Chapters and 4th Degree Assemblies cannot submit resolution**

Imagine that it's the 1500's and that Fr. McGivney founded the Knights of Columbus in 1482. Of course were a little ahead of Christopher Columbus doing all the things he is noted for, so let's assume he's accomplished all of that a bit earlier than 1492. OK, got it? What kinds of programs are making your Knights of Columbus council successful? How about Church activities? Maybe your council held a rally to support your Bishop's and Pope Leo's efforts to counter Martin Luther and the Protestant Reformation movement. Or perhaps your council sponsors a Spanish missionary in some far off land called America.

Youth? One local council hosts an annual joust competition for the local teens. It's great frivolity and it helps build the character of our youth so they grow to be strong members of our medieval society. Just the kind of young brave people we want in our community.

Speaking of Community activities, what are you doing there? Last month my council organized a community farewell festival for a local adventurer leaving port to try and find a shipping route around the world. Local pheasant and venison was served to over 400 attendees. Ferdinand Magellan is a fine member of our community, although some feel he might be a little eccentric thinking he can circumvent the globe.

OK, make-believe time is over. This wasn't intended to be a history lesson, and the history implied here does not pretend to be accurate. The point of this little exercise is to illustrate how the times in which we live directly influence what we do to define ourselves. Holding a rally today, in 2011, to protest the Protestant Reformation is ludicrous. Holding a joust competition for youth will likely be met with cries from local parents and community leaders asking how the K of C could possibly promote such a barbaric activity. The community festival still has some validity to it. But instead of saluting an adventurer leaving for an around the world trip, perhaps it is held for a local soldier heading overseas or returning from a deployment.

As times change, we must also change. What does your council programming look like? Are you still doing the same activities you did in the 1970's and 1980's? Are they still relevant? Do they excite your members and their families? Probably not. And perhaps that is why your council is having a hard time attracting new members to participate. Even programs you may have started in the last 10 years need to be tweaked occasionally to stay

fresh. Much has changed in the last 10 years and change occurs faster and faster. Ten years ago it was cool to have a flip phone to "talk" to somebody. Now it's commonplace to use a smartphone to email, text, shop, navigate, and watch TV. In January 2001, did you really know who Osama Bin Laden was? In February 2001 gasoline was selling for about \$1.55/gal, and we weren't happy about it.

Who knows what we'll be doing in 10 years or 20 years. But you can be certain that what works and is successful today may not be so successful tomorrow. The world moves fast and waits for no one. A successful council must be innovative with its programming to serve the world around it. Tap into the talents of your entire membership to re-energize your programs. Don't wait for someone to tell you what to do. Be the council that sets the example leads the charge with the next big thing!

CEREMONIALS ARE CHANGING FOR THE BETTER

Every Grand Knight should have received an updated 1st Degree Ceremonial Packet from the Supreme that included a Large Print version of the 1st Degree Text and a CD with an audio version of the Chancellor's part of the Ceremonial.

The intent of this update is very simply a means to develop Council 1st Degree teams where there either isn't an Active Working Council 1st Degree Team or a Team in need of re-vitalization.

Teams are NOW allowed to read their parts professionally with the expectation that through continued performance of this degree will eventually lead to a "memorized" performance of future degrees. A Council 1st Degree should perform a minimum of 4 Degrees each year to be proficient.

If a Chancellor is not available, at this time, the Council Degree Team can utilize the Audio Disk available by:

- 1) Having the Grand Knight conduct the Pledge of Secrecy and;
- 2) Warden perform the visual aspects of the Chancellor's part while the audio is be played by the Music Director

This will provide for an impressive exemplification of the Order's Primary Virtue of Charity.

The 3rd Degree is in the Midst of modification with serious revisions intended to further exemplify the Order's principle of Fraternity while emphasizing our Catholic Faith. There will further New 3rd Degree presentations made as follows: Sunday February 20, 2011 in Utica, IL., Sunday March 6, 2011 in Dixon, IL., Sunday April 17,

2011 in Lake Zurich, IL Please attend, if possible, and your feedback will be most welcomed.

The Supreme Council continues to upgrade our Ceremonials to enhance and impress our Membership to be inspired to "Live the Principles of Our Order and Our Faith"
