

CATHOLIC CITIZENSHIP ESSAY CONTEST

All councils and assemblies are encouraged to sponsor the Catholic Citizenship Essay Contest at schools in their communities. The contest is open to all Catholic students — in public, private or parochial schools — in grades 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12 during the current school year, and is a creative way to encourage young people to become citizens who are firmly grounded in their faith.

This year's theme is "**Going to the Peripheries.**" The contest opens the doors of young minds, enabling the entrants to be creative, thoughtful and introspective in their work.

2018 Essay Contest Theme:

Discuss the role of the Catholic Church going to the peripheries, then select one of the following ideas to complete your essay:

- a) Describe the work of one widely known current Catholic who went to the periphery.
- b) Describe the work of one widely known historical Catholic who went to the periphery.
- c) Describe the work of one person in your life, who helps alleviate human suffering.

First place winners will receive a check for \$300, and two runners-up for each grade level will receive \$100, awarded by Knights of Columbus Supreme Council.
